## Safety at home and improved health are goals of First Presbyterian's June 7 physical therapy workshop

The Deacons of Edinboro Presbyterian Church have identified a frequent community need, and there is a specific activity which will address this. Physical Therapist Chris Bailey will be our guest speaker for an afternoon seminar on Tuesday afternoon, June 7. His presentation will give practical advice on vertigo,

balance, and safety at home. This is a significant matter for many people, especially for older adults, but the issues could apply to anyone. This workshop could give you information for yourself, but it also can be of interest to anyone who wants to enhance the lives of an aging parent or another loved one or neighbor.

There is no cost for the program; it is offered by FUPC as a gift to our congregation and the entire community. Reservations are appreciated (by calling 814-315-3998), but last-minute walk-ins will also be welcomed. Light refreshments will be provided by our Fellowship Team.

Local Mission Team moderator Jan Schulz gave her own personal story of how physical therapists relieved chronic pain after an accident years ago, and how she learned techniques that have helped her reduce dizziness and improved her balance. Jan's story was given at last week's sanctuary service and will be shown as part of an upcoming **Worship Online**.

## From the Pastor

### Reaching out into the community: Our mandate, our privilege

As you and I navigate this “new season” of faith and faithfulness, I am grateful for the series of conversations that have happened this year. Elected leaders, and others with a heart for this congregation’s past and present and future, have invested intentional time and prayer about FUPC. Some of the new callings we have are related to the challenges – and even the benefits and new lessons – which came to us in the Covid Era. Some of what we do next will actually be based on trends that have been *decades* in the making. Some of the “next” will be anchored in our strong history and heritage, doing better at what we’ve always done or bringing back some aspect of what worked well before. All these are true. Also true is a reality that the second half of 2022 and beyond will require us to turn away from past and present and experiment, veer, innovate or explore.

How are we to make decisions, not on what we prefer, not on what we want, but instead on who the True Lord of the Church is calling us to be? I really like the three-angled outline which came from our latest discernment retreat. First, if we are wondering what God would have us to do next, it makes sense to ask God about it. Prayer undergirds our discernment, asking the Lord for guidance and vision and blessing, and listening for definitive direction which God offers to us. Second, Inward care is our mutual concern and prayer and connection with each other. The people of the church would do well to connect with ... the people of the church. We have much to offer each other. Some of us are hurting, many are stressed, more than a few are out of the loop. This intra-congregational ministry is especially important to our vitality, especially in this time when most of our routines were interrupted, the institutions around us are uncertain, and when divisiveness seems to be the common currency of our culture.

As these things are true within the church “family”, they also are pervasive “out there”. The people we pass on the road, who live down the street, who cut our hair and bag our groceries and teach our children are facing those same stresses. The church has ways to assist. Our calling card is Christ. Our hope, when we demonstrate it, can become contagious. The third – and equally important – segment of our Planning Pyramid is community connections. A church which exists only for its current members is a social club or a secret society. Such organizations have their value, but that is not our primary purpose. Our mandate is to go and make disciples. Our mandate is to, with the Holy Spirit’s help, teach others everything which Jesus taught his followers. Our mandate is to give them something to eat, visit the lonely and the prisoner, stand up against all injustice, feed the poor, and forgive the sinner.

We have always been a church with that outward focus too. Look at the number of our members who are active in leadership and servanthood roles elsewhere in the community. FUPC has been good to support individuals and local ministry agencies. Our giving to hunger programs and worldwide mission is impressive.

I am glad for some of the new and returning ways we are now seeking to impact our neighbors in the community. Eventually, a few of those folks may become active in this congregation, and that will be absolutely great and give good reason to express gratitude to God. That, though, is not our most noble, most urgent goal. As you look at this sample list, may we be thankful for these opportunities, and use them to inspire more:

Our presentation on balance and vertigo and home safety by a physical therapist.

The return of VBS in conjunction with our partner churches in the area. (VBS, by the way, can have the faith-fostering effect of a “month of Sundays” of most anything else we do!)

I expect we soon will offer a similar Speaker Series event to help young families with their current stresses.

There is interest in having a booth at the Boro Fireworks event. (This could be a food truck, a game booth, or just handing out water and meeting people....If you want to help, please let me know soon.)

Using my journalism background, I continue to submit items to the West County Journal and Family Life Radio, locally airing on 89.8 and 102.7 FM. (On your behalf, I can influence people we don’t reach with our in-house stuff or our church website.)

Our medical equipment loaner ministry sees an average of one or two people here each week.

The “Garden of Edin” community garden is full and busy and producing produce. It also is producing friendships and outreach to people who would not meet each other any other way.

Bakers from our congregation send Cookies For The Troops every month. (If you’d be willing to help, once as a sub or on an ongoing basis, please call Sue Johnson.)

I’ve scheduled a Card Party for our neighbors at Edinboro Manor across the street. Their protocols change from week to week, necessarily, but while we wait for the return of our monthly Worship and Communion visits there, we can deliver a little kindness and sunshine across the street.

It seems like it’s been Wedding Season again. In part because of the Covid pause and partly because of the cycles of life, I am working with an above-average number of wedding couples. My conversations with them (and the benefits of the Prepare-Enrich program I use) are influential to these delightful folks at a key transition in their young lives.

It’s time to renew our offer to host Financial Peace University, a nine-week financial management class. With the economy as it is for now, I imagine there will be more than a few folks who could be blessed by this.

The mandate our Lord gives to Christians is to look beyond ourselves. It’s not only a mandate. It is a great privilege to influence individuals and communities and societies. Let’s keep looking outward. And upward.

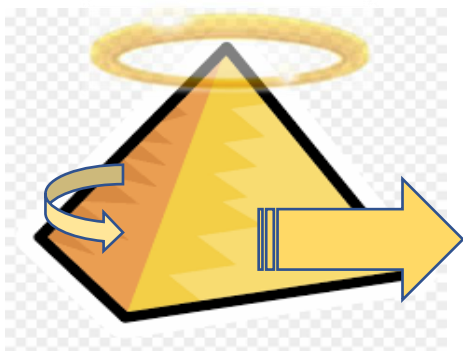

# **Community VBS returns as multiple Edinboro churches, offer faith-building opportunities for our area's children**

After being sidelined the past two summers due to caution related to the Covid-19 pandemic, our Edinboro Community Vacation Bible School is on its way back for the summer of 2022! We at Edinboro Presbyterian are happy to be among the local congregations who will combine again to provide a full exciting week of Bible stories, songs, games and lessons for the children we serve.

VBS is an important and effective outreach for the Gospel of Jesus Christ. It is not an exaggeration to say that in these five full mornings, participants can get a “month of Sundays” worth of knowledge, understanding and appreciation for the Lord. Almost literally, a month of Sundays’ worth.

Please extend your invitation to your child’s friends to be a part of this. Plan that your family members will attend. In order that we can be sure to have the staffing and supplies ready for Day 1, preregistration is required. You can sign up online anytime before June 30.

The location and dates have changed for 2022 compared to the past several years we have sponsored the combined VBS. This year, we will be at the social hall of Our Lady of the Lake Roman Catholic Church. The dates have moved later in the summer, to avoid overlapping with similar events which a few other congregations will hold in June. Ours will be weekday mornings, July 11-15.

Registration and further information are available online. New this year, you can also pay online. If you want more details, or you would like to request a little help to reduce the small registration fee, make that request through the FUPC office soon. We have received several gifts from church members which we can use to provide scholarships to church members or to families you invite. Contact Greg Gillispie or Sue Johnson to request this.

The theme for this multi-church VBS is “Food Truck Party: On a Roll with God.” It invites children to pray as Jesus teaches us in Matthew 6:11 – “Give us this day our daily bread.” These words serve as a reminder that everything we have comes from God — and that it's by turning to God in prayer that all of our daily needs are met.

Each day will focus on either an Old Testament or New Testament story where the Bible talks about food:

- Manna and Quail: Exodus 16
- The Widow’s Endless Oil: 1 Kings 17
- Eating the Good Stuff: Daniel 1
- Jesus Feeds 5000: John 6
- Breakfast on the Beach: John 21

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## Helping the young generations with today's stresses

The current cover story of *Presbyterians Today*, our denominations official magazine, gave examples of how some churches are starting hands-on ministries to help young people with the stresses that weigh them down. Issues of mental health and mindfulness apply to all generations – but are uniquely significant to children and teens whose growing-up years have been dominated by Covid restrictions, online schooling and social isolation.

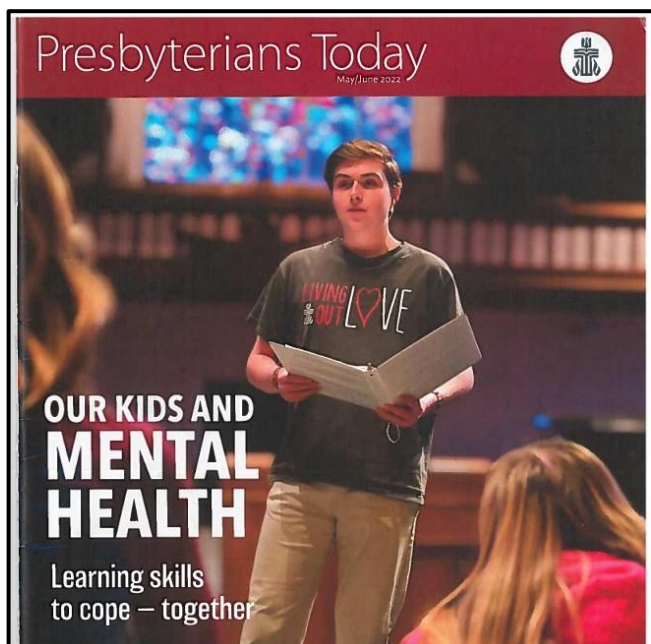
Edinboro Presbyterian's elders invested time at a recent meeting discussing these matters, and copies of the article were mailed and e-mailed to our younger families. You too can pick up a printed copy of the magazine information at FUPC or request that we mail you one. Go to the [church website](#) to see an e-version. The goal is to reflect on the issues, see what some other places have tried, and explore what avenues we might prioritize to help young people and their families. This obviously affects people with direct connections to FUPC, but there are also possible outreaches into the community.

A few highlights:

**Mindfulness practices** can help a person to pause, calm down, and deal effectively with emotions: Deep breathing for just two minutes is one. Another is to squeeze your hands as if squeezing an orange, letting go, squeezing again, then pretending to shake off the juice (and actually shake away some of the stress).

**Support one another**, friend to friend, parent to child, child to parent, family to family, volunteers to schools. With some churches, what used to be "youth group" has transitioned to mental-health check-ins.

**Emphasize that Christians have particular resources** for overcoming chaos, disappointment and stresses. Remind each other of the benefits and perspectives which come through our faith, the Scriptures, our prayer life, and Christian music.
